Wrap-up of Early Childhood Focus

The Public Policy Action Team is winding up our Public Policy focus on early childhood with a major event that we hope will lay the groundwork for a continued community effort to address early childhood needs.

This year Colorado Springs Branch will have accomplished our goal of educating the community about early childhood issues.

Our work feeds into the work of the Early Childhood Colorado Partnership (ECCP), which is a broad and diverse network of state and local agencies, nonprofits, early childhood councils, universities and others. ECCP works through Civic Canopy (an organization that contracts with ECCP to provide community organization/facilitation/communication expertise) in a cross-discipline effort to align the effort across the state to create a comprehensive early childhood system that includes health, mental health, family support services and early care and learning.

Cara and the Public Policy Action Team are exploring the possibility of identifying agency and community leaders willing to step into the leadership role of a reorganized Pikes Peak RoA Community Alliance. They can then figure out the "next steps" for Colorado Springs to strengthen our community connection with the Early Childhood Colorado Partnership/Civic Canopy.

A community resource to treasure, Carol Scott and the F4T facilitators have proven to be the key component for community engagement in our Branch's Public Policy effort to bring together "grass roots" community members and community leaders. They helped us learn about early childhood issues through facilitated Community Dialogue.

Food for Thought: Breaking Bread Building Bridges is a program of the Colorado Springs Diversity Forum, coordinated by volunteer steering committee. Twice a



year, participants are recruited to dialogue over dinner about current issues. Several groups are formed each time and will commit to meeting 5 times in the following 6 months to engage in respectful dialog among people from a variety of backgrounds. Topics are chosen by the group and tend to generate a variety of options which are discussed with the support of ground rules and a neutral facilitator.

Excellent Practice for Participation in AAUW Committee work and Board Membership

F4T dialogue is a wonderful way to learn skills such as staying focused during a discussion, developing awareness of equitable sharing time, active listening, and developing comfort in sharing diverse opinions in a respectful manner.

Colorado Springs Branch History

Colorado Springs was one of the "founding" mother branches of Colorado AAUW in 1921, having actually been established locally in 1915. The first branch President was Adelaide Denis. Since then, we have had 49 Presidents and have achieved 21 Honorary Life members (50 years of membership in AAUW!)



Colorado Springs has hosted the Colorado AAUW State Convention eight times – about every ten years starting in 1931. Forever embedded in everyone's memory is the "Blizzard" Convention of May 1978. The branch also hosted the Regional Conference in 1988.

During the 1960's and 70's, COS membership swelled to over 450 members with a wide array of interest groups. However, the Branch needed a fund-raiser other than book and calendar sales. Out of necessity, Tailored Tours was born and became the branch's unique fund-raising effort for the Educational Foundation between 1980 and 1993. Previously, the only bus tours available were not adapted to the interests of the group. Originally, the plan was to treat women to tea in a member's historic home and lecture on the city's history. That never materialized. The first tour group was spouses of the American Bar Association who wanted to see historic homes. Later the typical tour group was either the spouses of delegates to a convention or military reunions.

In all, there were fifteen tour guides trained to step on a bus and narrate the history of the Pikes Peak region for a half or full day. In the first years, the clients provided the bus. As Tailored Tours grew, we hired the busses ourselves. Almost every tour included the Air Force Academy and the Garden of the Gods. Others wanted to see the historic homes on the North End and in the Broadmoor or to learn about Old Colorado City and Manitou or to tour the Olympic Training Center. Often, we went up the Pikes Peak cog railroad. Sometimes we included Ute Pass and the gold camps of Cripple Creek and Victor. Other times we went to the Royal Gorge or rafting on the Arkansas. We learned to make lunch reservations or to arrange for box lunches, how much shopping time should be allowed, and how to keep the drivers happy and cooperative.

Many members assisted in researching and developing scripts. Some preferred to work behind the scenes rather than do actual guiding. One (several over the life of the project) served as treasurer. Two working as a team made the contacts, bid the tours, assigned the guides and billed the clients. Everyone involved studied local history and visited sites of interest. There were monthly meetings for further education, for practicing our skills, and for camaraderie.

We started with a typewriter, then went to a word processor. There was no email and no cell phones! In the course of the project, COS netted about \$30,000. The project disbanded because of burn-out and at that time about \$10,000 remained in the treasury. Every year some of that money is allotted to EF. Our Branch is still benefiting from Tailored Tours!

In addition to Tailored Tours, the branch has also been visible in the community for many years for sponsoring a Knowledge Bowl for middle and high school students and giving awards at the Colorado College History Day and the Pikes Peak Regional Science Fair. The branch annually sponsors a scholarship to a local collegiate.

The Colorado Springs Branch is 93 years old and going strong.

I scan these transcripts, recommendation letters, applications, and personal essays into individual pdf files which then are distributed electronically by email to our dedicated committee scorers: Joann Oh, Sally Metzger, Margaret Baptist, and Linda McIlnay. We will read the applications and grade them according to a scoring rubric that incorporates academic excellence, financial needs, personal statement, and letter of recommendation.

On April 19th, as a committee we will then discuss the candidates and choose the top 5 applicants. This year, recipients will be receiving \$1,000 to apply towards their education. This process of evaluating and discussion is always a vibrant, if not time consuming process, in order to come to a consensus about our winners. With so many of the applicants having need and merit, it is always a challenge.

On May 1st, we will conduct interviews with each of the 5 recipients and hear firsthand their stories, hopes and career aspirations. Our Local Scholarship committee will introduce the winners to you at the May 14th brunch and branch meeting to be held at Patty Jewett Golf course clubhouse.

The scholarship brunch is a wonderful opportunity for each of you that attends the meeting to introduce yourselves to these energetic, striving women and tell them a bit about your own journey and career path. You are role models to these young women who are on the path to careers you may have already experienced. Feedback from former scholarship recipients indicate that they really value the connections and advice they receive from our members who sit with them at the scholarship brunch. This most worthwhile event reminds me of how we each make our journey in life with the help of others along the way.
