LOCAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Our final branch meeting of the year on May 9 at The Warehouse was the high point of the year for Local Scholarships because our five \$1000 winners were greeted by many interested women, described by the committee chair, who presented each one with her framed certificate and a long-stemmed yellow rose, and applauded by the many attending branch members. The Local Scholarships Committee, Margaret Baptist, Charlotte Gagne, Shirlea Griswold, and Linda McIlnay, worked very hard to read and evaluate about 130 pages from the 21 completed applications and then decide on the five winners. As always, we wished that we could have given more scholarships, but we were very, very grateful to our members for their generosity in funding these. Please remember to attend Author's Day, our major scholarships fundraiser on Nov. 14, and bring a friend!

Here are brief bios of our winners in alphabetical order:

Kimberly Copley lived in Germany with her missionary parents until she was 18 when she came to the U.S. and had to adapt both scholastically and personally to fit into her "American College Experience" at PPCC. Her career goal is to be an army nurse. To that end, she is combining the difficult UCCS Beth-El Nursing Program with a dedicated commitment to the UCCS Mountain Ranger Battalion ROTC. In 2013 she was selected the ROTC Freshman Cadet of the Year. In 2014 she was one of only two female cadets on the winning Ranger Challenge Team, which in seven hours ran through many mental and physical challenges, such as getting ten team members with 35-lb. packs across a ravine on a one-rope bridge, all in three minutes. So far in 2015, she has led teams ranging from 9 to 50 members with multiple subordinate teams. She also tutors in German at the UCCS Language Learning Center, teaches Sunday school to four-year-olds, and is Military Awareness Club V.P. and Student Nurses Association treasurer. In addition, she tutors other female cadets and sponsors a sophomore cadet. Kimberly wrote at the beginning of her personal statement, "Passion provides one with motivation, ambition, and purpose, allowing one to not only build a career but to make a difference in that career." She wrote in her conclusion, "Becoming an army nurse is not simply a career choice but a calling, a calling that requires commitment and determination. My goal is to serve and give back to those who have given on my behalf. Nursing is not something you do; it is who you are. It is what I plan to be. I have found my passion."

Nassia Duncan was in second grade when she visited her dying grandmother in South Africa, where she first became aware of what sickness, poverty, and death truly meant, a realization that was intensified recently on another trip. In pursuit of her goal of working in a non-profit to combat poverty and illnesses such as HIV/AIDS, typhoid, hepatitis, and other viruses in South Africa, Nassia earned an A.S. degree at PPCC and is enrolled in the UCCS Bachelor's of Healthcare Science: Medical Laboratory Science Option. She works 32 hours/week doing TV closed captioning to pay for her own education. In addition, she encourages women to pursue careers in STEM fields by her example and by her informative monthly Career Day presentations at her church. Nassia wrote, "We are told too often what is proper for a woman and not often enough what is possible for a person." She has built homes for poor families in Tijuana, Mexico, and works with A Family for Every Orphan, which finds homes for orphans in Russia, Ukraine, Uganda, Nepal, and India. Her recommender, a 22-year U.S. Army officer who attended West Point, wrote, "I have never met such a determined, clearly-organized, and well-intentioned young woman. Nassia works hard at *everything!*"

Ivonne Montano, the mother of a five-year-old and a two-month-old and a full-time UCCS student, has also had worldwide experiences that led to her major in the UCCS interdisciplinary program Bachelor's of Innovation: Inclusive Early Childhood Education with a focus on dual language learners and children with disabilities. As a child she moved with her family from Chihuahua, Mexico, to a small town in

Minnesota, where because of her ethnicity and her family's economic status she realized that she "would never be adequate enough for my teachers nor for my peers." Did she become a victim? No. At 17 she joined the U.S. Army and served two years in Afghanistan, where she realized her own strength, courage, intelligence and leadership ability as well as her ability to adapt to new situations and to communicate with various levels of people. As a military spouse, she worked for three years in Italy in the Special Education Department, an experience that opened her eyes to the mistreatment of special needs children and the lack of services and support for their families. Her recommender wrote that Ivonne is "a researcher of children, intently and carefully observing and finding insightful ways to apply course content to practical settings. . . .She takes great care to plan rich experiences which engage each child in his or her unique interest and developmental level, a task she is uniquely successful in due to the depth of relationship she cultivates with each." Ivonne wrote, "I want to show children that learning can not only be fun but can also be empowering."

Nicole Renfrow earned an A.A. degree in business/accounting from PPCC, and next year she will receive her B.A. in accounting from UCCS. Nicole loves numbers, so here are some numbers that help describe her abilities and challenges: Her Grade Point Average (GPA) for her PPCC degree was 3.93. Her current GPA as a full-time student at UCCS is 4.0. She has for the past seven years worked full-time for 50 or more hours/week as an accountant/bookkeeper and now assistant general manager for a restaurant chain. And she is the single mother of a six-year-old daughter. Nicole grew up as a privileged child: She lived in a happy, stable home, attended the best schools, took violin lessons from the age of two, had piano lessons, played sports, learned to speak French, and in seventh grade was enrolled in the International Baccalaureate Programme. However, at 16 she chose to leave home, drop out of school, and get a job in a restaurant. She earned her GED on her own. To earn more money, she took a second job as a part-time bookkeeper--and discovered her passion for numbers, for accounting. Her recommender, a co-worker, gives her high praise for her trustworthiness, dependability, motivation, and strong work ethic. Nicole has established a difficult but exceptionally clear, achievable path to her ultimate goal of becoming a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) with her own accounting firm.

Joanne Yeshulas has just completed her A.S. degree in biology at PPCC, and in the fall will move on to UCCS for her B.S. degree in chemistry and then further graduate degrees that will allow her to do biomedical research, possibly in water purification for Third World countries. Joanne has come a long, hard way: Aged four and a half and knowing no English, she was adopted from a South Korean orphanage and grew up in an abusive home in Boston. At 14 she became a ward of the State of Massachusetts and lived in a foster home. By 16 she was working three jobs, yet she still graduated from high school. She is now a full-time student, a full-time Correctional Officer One at the Colorado State Penitentiary in Canon City, and a single mother to a son and daughter, aged 10 and 13. She wrote, "My strongest attributes are my personal drive and persistence." "[At PPCC] I learned that I am better than I was led to believe my entire life and that the world is an amazing place full of selfless people. Some of us call these people teachers or professors. They have not only taught me about the subject matter of my classes, but also of the opportunities available to me as long as I continue to work hard. . . . Now I hope to also contribute and impact other people's lives in a positive way. I would like to help others reach their goals, whether that is by providing motivation, actively listening, or physically being there for them." Her recommender wrote, "Joanne is a remarkable person. She is a hard worker, a dedicated mom, and a great student. . . . She has the resolve, the determination, and the willingness to do the work. I am confident that she will succeed."

We give to each of these amazing women our highest hopes and deepest confidence that they will indeed succeed, not only academically but in all of the multiple roles that they work at so very hard and fill so very well.

HISTORY DAY

On April 10 Jan Condit, Susan Bydalek, and I judged the History Day exhibits at Colorado College and awarded two \$25 prizes on behalf of the Colorado Springs Branch of AAUW. Last year we were discouraged by the poor quality of the exhibits and are happy to report that this year they were much better. As in the past, we considered only poster board exhibits at the junior (middle school) level featuring a woman who exemplifies the year's theme. This year's theme was Leadership and Legacy.

Our individual winner was Nia Hill from Palmer. Her topic was Howard University, from which both of her parents graduated. In addition to giving historic background on Howard, Nia provided photos of many alums, including women, who became world leaders and a blurb about each of them. The exhibit was attractive, informative, and easy to read.

Our choice for group winner was an exhibit on Harriet Tubman prepared by Palmer students Megan Sievert and Natalie Reece. A memorable fact was that Tubman freed 1000 slaves, each one at the risk of her own life. They had cleverly included a railroad track winding through their printed material. We are careful not to be overwhelmed by creativity, but we do like to see it combined with research.

Thanks to our Branch members, we are able to encourage education and research, both of which are in our mission statement. At the awards ceremony in Shove Chapel, AAUW is promoted to the community in attendance, mainly family members.

In case you have a student interested in History Day, we suggest that a boy investigate a female subject. We have never had the opportunity to consider such an exhibit. Member and History Day supporter Kathy McBride adds that local history topics are largely neglected by the students.
