SIX LOCAL SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

The high point of our annual Local Scholarships cycle was celebrated at our May 19th branch meeting when all six of our scholarship recipients were presented their awards in front of 50 attending members, receiving a standing ovation. Our members have demonstrated a commitment to furthering the educational advancement of women in our community. This year's winners have majors in Education, Nursing, Biochemistry, Counseling, and Pre-Law. Each of these recipients has already had experience specific to their major and has a plan to achieve her goals.

We had another great Local Scholarships Committee: **Joann Oh, Margaret Baptist, Sally Metzger, Dee Simon,** and **Charlotte Gagne** evaluated 28 applicants on an equally weighted criteria of academic excellent, financial need, personal presentation, and letter of recommendation. We examine the scholarship application submissions carefully, reading between the lines, to determine which applicants demonstrate ability, career direction, ethics, community involvement, and goal commitment. Each of these women have shown clear direction and goal achievement, already on this path to obtaining their degree. The following are the profiles of our six scholars this year:

Mikaela Montoya

Mikaela Montoya attended Fountain Fort Carson High school, grew up in Widefield/Security, and has attended CSU Pueblo and UCCS. She is an Inclusive Early Childhood Education major who will be getting her CO teaching license along with an endorsement in Special education. Her goal is to become an Early Intervention Preschool teacher and a Board Certified Behavioral Analyst. Mikaela comes from a family of special educators: her parents are both in this field. Currently, she is putting herself through school by working at the UCCS Family Development Center in the toddler and preschool center. Before that she did what many young adults in our society do: fast food and restaurant work. She lives at home and is to be commended for having a low student debt. She has managed this by working and going to school at the same time. Mikaela says that her students bring her much joy and she genuinely loves the time she spends teaching them. Mikaela was getting experience in her field early on: she babysat two young boys in foster care who were eventually placed in the care of her parents for a while. Seeing that these two boys needed a stable, loving caregiver gave Mikaela the motivation to enter the teaching field. She also volunteered at her mother's preschool class where she developed an interest in working with the significant needs students. She gravitated to the challenging autistic students and found herself in demand as a babysitter with this population before she was in high school. She has already worked with foster care children, medically fragile students, and students with disabilities. Not only is she close to her educational goals, she is already working in the field. Her recommender states that she is positive, hardworking, well organized, with a strong sense of responsibility. Her collaboration and teamwork skills benefit her peers and co-workers. It is my pleasure to award this scholarship to Mikaela Montoya.

Nelly Mathenge

Nelly Mathenge is a 45 year old mother of 4 children, returning to college to earn her first bachelor's degree. Born in Kenya, graduated from high school in Nairobi, Nelly followed her minister husband to Botswana, and eventually to the United States in 2002. She is finishing her second year at PPCC, majoring in Psychology, and will attend UCCS in the Fall. She plans to pursue a master's degree in counseling with an ultimate goal of working with adolescent youth. Over the years she has been involved with elementary-age children, teens, and young adults in church volunteer positions, as well as her work with the homeless through Springs Rescue Mission. Her next endeavor is volunteering with St. Mary's Home, a non-profit organization that reaches out to poverty stricken single mothers and assists them in breaking the cycle of poverty through life classes and additional college or vocational training.

Nelly was selected from among thousands of applicants, statewide, to be one of 40 All-Colorado Academic team in recognition of scholarly achievements of students enrolled in all of Colorado's two- year colleges. She is a member of Phi Theta Kappa and a shining star in her online and on campus classes. She writes beautifully, an even more impressive feat when considering English is her third language: Her first is native Kikuyu, Swahili her second, and English her third language, although all coursework K-12 was in English. She continues to

participate in her children's schools whenever she can. Her eldest son is off to college in one year, so with 4 children, Nelly appreciates this monetary support, allowing her to take full time credits and an opportunity to complete her degree within a reasonable stretch of time. She, like our other scholarship recipients, is delving into her chosen profession by volunteering with Springs Rescue Mission and youth in her community. Any of us who have had mothers who returned for a degree while raising a family, understands this is not an easy road. As her recommender states, "Nelly is navigating this road beautifully."

Mariah Mayhugh:

Mariah Mayhugh is a juggler. She goes to school half the week for high school and the other half for college. She will receive her high school diploma and associates of arts degree on the same day with the honor of being second in her high school class. Imagine starting your college journey with 74 completed college units, all paid for with D49 tax payer dollars.

Mariah found her passion early in life. She aspires to be a pediatric nurse, after a serious childhood illness gave her firsthand experience with the pediatric nurses who cared for her. She now wants to care for children the way that the nurses at Children's Hospital cared for her. Mariah is passionate, outspoken, and responsible. She offers to give speeches and was one of several students who participated in the Multi-Cultural Awareness Conference. She chose a unique topic: how a high school student in college exists in two subcultures simultaneously, complete with challenges, assumptions, and prejudices from the one toward the other. She gave an astute, professional quality speech that generated audience questions. Mariah's coursework includes 18 credits, CNA training in addition to her high school work. She has carefully navigated two worlds and emerged a winner. She is editor of her high school yearbook, active in National Honor Society, National Art Honor Society, and chair of the "Puppy Love" charity dance, a fundraiser for National Mill Dog Rescue. She holds down a part-time job at her church, assisting in a childcare program for children whose parents attend bible study classes. Her recommender states that she is extremely conscientious about all aspects of her learning and is quick to catch subtleties of information and interpretation. She was also tenaciously dedicated to planning her degree program with great care, keeping track of two institutions requirements, consulting with advisors, and assuring what her funding would cover. College today is so different from when many of our AAUW members attended. Gone are the days of one institution for 4 years---Enter the era of online coursework, concurrent enrollment, community college, and eventually a 4 year university. Mariah is a great example of this new patchwork approach to education that meets an individual's academic and economic resources.

Stephanie Warren:

Stephanie Warren is a mother of four children and a UCCS junior, majoring in Business and Pre-Law with a goal of becoming a constitutional lawyer, advocating for victims and survivor of domestic violence and sexual abuse.

Stephanie understands this world, first hand, as a survivor of sexual assault and domestic violence. Despite a Permanent Protection Ord3er and 7 Military protection orders, this experience did not destroy her growth or define her family. She is raising 4 children, 15, 14, 11, and 5 and she is determined to be the first in her family to attend and graduate college while being a role model for her children.

Stephanie recently wrote 587 congressional letters to gain justice for her case, while navigating the political quagmire of Fort Carson. She is recognized by her professors, former Colorado Springs Police Department officers and criminal lawyers, as the top of her class in terms of understanding this difficult subject. She was chosen by one of her professors to be a co-contributor to a research project on this topic given her personal and extensive academic research on domestic violence. Stephanie continues ongoing therapy and now assists other victims of assault to help them understand the complex psychological interactions that enter into these relationships. Giving back to others and helping to break the cycle of abuse is Stephanie's goal in life. She views her college degree as the first stepping stone toward her goal of making not just her family, but her community and future generations better.

Yulia Shtanko

Yulia Shtanko completed the Early Colleges program through School District 11, graduating concurrently from high school and earning an Associates of Science degree, with 94 college credits. She will enter UCCS in the Fall as a Junior major in Biochemistry. Yulia catapulted herself on this trajectory by teaching herself Pre-Calculus in order to test out of the pre-requisites for a college level Calculus course targeted for pre-med majors. Yulia has been flying high from an early age. She and her mother left Kyrgyzstan when Yulia was two years old, leaving family and an unhealthy relationship, and took a job in Japan. Her mother remarried an Air Force serviceman and Yulia lived and attended school in Japan, Germany, Krgitstan, and the United States. She was all set to enter Liberty High school as a freshmen when her mother heard about the Early Learning Colleges program in D11. The rest (94 college units later) is history.

Yulia has many friends among her high school and college peers, is deeply admired by the faculty, and has served in leadership capacity in the Early Learning Colleges National Honor Society. She has an incredible resume of volunteer work and community service from the arts to medicine to outdoors and nature. Her recommender sees her as an extremely well-rounded individual who has great passion and empathy in all she does.

You may have seen Yulia's picture in the Gazette Telegraph featuring the Best and the Brightest,. She was honored for her academic excellence at the Early Colleges program, National Honor Society, Memorial Hospital Volunteer, and recipient of the GRIT scholarship, a scholarship that honors students excellence from her essay on perseverance which won first place.

Yulia's goal is to become a medical doctor in a military hospital. She is already 94 credits on her way!

Emily Grenier:

Emily Grenier is a 4.0 GPA student at UCCS in the Inclusive Early Childhood Education program. She attended an online high school in Douglas County, PPCC, and now UCCS. Emily is no stranger to her chosen field of elementary education. She is already employed as a preschool teacher in Douglas County and has worked as a lead Bible teacher in her church's Vacation Bible school. She took on the role of Children's Education specialist as a lead teacher and facilitator of a one room children's class, including toddler through elementary aged children. It seems like her vocational and free time revolve around young children. For two summers, she participated in a Youth mission program in the Ukraine, assisting orphans and 80 young children in a summer camp in the Carpathian Mountains. Her recommender states that Emily is highly committed to children and following the career path to education,

Emily's decision to attend an online high school was a practical one—it is 20 minutes to the bus stop for students in Larkspur who attend Palmer Ridge High school in Monument or Castleview High school in Castle Rock. Emily saw the realities of that and decided to work, save money for college, and attend online high school.

Emily plans to continue to work part time to pay for her education. This scholarship will allow her to focus less on the financial responsibilities of her education and more on her studies. We look carefully at each of our applicants to see what kinds of experience they have in their chosen field. Emily has been immersed in the world of teaching children through high school as well as college.

We give to each of these amazing women our highest hopes and deepest confidence that they will indeed succeed, not only academically, but in the multiple roles that they work so hard to fill.
