A fair measure of relief (we made it!), certainly excitement about the future, but primarily gratitude for being given this opportunity to learn and lead such an extraordinary group of women, dedicated to such a critical mission.

We've accomplished a lot together:

- Added 28 new/rejoining members.
- Successfully navigated a major transition at the national level in how membership data is handled and provided.
- Hosted eight branch meetings with dynamic speakers who both informed and challenged
 us, including programs that centered diversity, equity ,and inclusion, with an average
 attendance of 40-60 members/guests at each event (and many more at the Welcome
 Coffee and Author's Day)
- Published monthly newsletters, eblasts, and updated the website and Facebook to keep members informed about branch, state and national AAUW news.
- Participated virtually or in person in Colorado AAUW meetings, including Leadership,
 Public Policy, and Annual Convention.
- Partnered with other local women's organizations to sponsor International Women's Day and Wine, Women and Chocolate.
- Raised more than \$7,000 through Authors Day/Silent Auction and added donations throughout the year to fund 6 annual scholarships for deserving women.

- Hosted our 1st annual AAUW Girl's STEM Day for 96 7th grade girls and began planning for the next, including securing outside funding through grants and donations as well as members' generous contributions.
- Participated in the Pikes Peak Regional Science Fair and presented AAUW awards.
- Invested targeted branch funds with the Pikes Peak Community Foundation to maximize interest while minimizing risk.
- Added another new Interest Group, Books to Film, and continued to grow our existing groups.

Congratulations on all you've achieved! And thank you again for the remarkable collaboration, cooperation, and grace you've shown me. I know you will do the same and more for the incoming board led by **Brenda Wolfe** and **Audrey McGuire**. 

AAUW Girls STEM DAY 2023

AAUW Colorado Springs Girl's STEM Day Returns Tuesday, October 17, 2023...And there's a role for you! Coming off the exciting Girl's STEM Day we premiered in November 2022, AAUW Colorado Springs is planning Girl's STEM Day, 2023, with 2x the number of school districts, 2x the number of students, and 2x the number of volunteers needed to plan and execute a successful

Are you a member of AAUW?

Then there's a part for you. Whether you volunteer to stuff student bags, register students, serve lunch, source t-shirts, set up student stations for experiments, or any one or more of a myriad of other tasks, it's your participation that will make a real difference. And should you be out of the country from now through October, you can support the STEM effort through a donation to the AAUW Colorado Springs STEM fund. What an exciting opportunity to influence the next generation of girls and women! Girl's STEM Day will focus on 7th grade girls, in Districts 2,3,8 and 11, some of the most diverse school districts in Colorado Springs, with some of the higher percentages of free and reduced school lunch.

Why STEM?

In Colorado, a full 10% of local jobs available are STEM jobs. In fact, there are 2 ½ entry level STEM jobs available for every new four-year college STEM graduate in this state. These jobs are some of the higher paying jobs available to college graduates. And yet, only 26% of STEM positions in Colorado are held by women.

Why 7th grade girls?

Societal messages start early that girls do not belong in these fields...particularly girls of color. By the time they reach middle school and begin to enroll in specific classes, girls are already beginning to avoid the traditional science, math and technology courses that are foundational to an eventual career in STEM. By sharing with young middle school girls the joys of STEM and helping them envision a fun and rewarding career in a STEM field, we'll inspire more girls to explore the possibilities, and begin to sign up for those basic STEM classes that represent a critical gateway to opportunity.

Why AAUW?

What organization is better positioned to lead in STEM than AAUW with its focus on advancing equity for women and girls through education, research and advocacy? In 2023, girls outnumber boys on college campuses nationwide, but there's still significant gaps in earning potential.

Why You?

Girl's STEM Day gives each of us the opportunity to live out our mission and put our values into action. A STEM career is not for every girl, but equal opportunity to explore and pursue STEM is

Names Honored 2023 Announcement

Recognizing a member for outstanding service to our Colorado Springs Branch has been a tradition since 1976. Along with the recognition by the membership, the recipient receives the gift of having their membership dues for the next year paid by the branch. The request for nominations was in both our February and March newsletters. Thank you to those of you who submitted nominations.

This year's recipient is **Marilyn Frydrych**. Marilyn is the current Co-VP Community Outreach AND Co-Chair of the STEM Day committee. She has also served for many years on the Local Scholarship committee and this year is also helping the Communications committee with newsletter creation.

Marilyn worked for over 3 years to organize the most recent inaugural AAUW STEM Day held

for 75 seventh grade girls. The culmination of her effort was a successful event held in Nov. 2022. Through her efforts, the visibility of AAUW Colorado Springs was spread throughout southeast Colorado Springs. She met with community leaders in three school districts, the United Way, and even met with City Council member, Yolanda Avila, who represents that area. Internally, Marilyn enlisted approximately 40 members to help in some capacity with the event - giving our members an opportunity to support the mission.

In addition, for the past five years, Marilyn has helped judge for the AAUW awards at the Pikes Regional Science Fair at UCCS. This year she helped convince the Board that we really needed to raise our award amount from \$25 to \$100 for each winner (one at the middle school level and one at the high school level). On top of that, at the State level for the past 2 years Marilyn judged for AAUW Colorado's state awards at the State Science Fair competition held at CSU in Ft Collins.

Lastly, she has led the Walkie-Talkies interest group for five years.

Branch Student Member, Ana V, Shines at AAUW's Conference for College Women Student Leaders

As reported previously, Ana V, a Colorado Springs AAUW scholarship awardee and branch student member, attended AAUW's NCCWSL Conference held at the University of Maryland this past May. Ana received one of two state scholarships available to Colorado student members to attend this prestigious conference. Here's what Ana shared about her experience at NCCWSL:

"Attending NCCWSL this year was an amazing experience. I was able to participate virtually last year but being able to do it in person added a new layer of sorority and encouragement. All the sessions I participated in provided me with a new opportunity to look at my own leadership and analyze the different paths I can take to enact it. One of my biggest takeaways came from the first session named Power, Influence, and Impact: Women and Transformative Leadership by Grace Virtue. She talked about the importance of self-awareness and positive deviance as tools to promote our authentic leadership as women in a professional environment where we face constant barriers due to gender bias. Most of the participants in this session shared similar experiences of being targeted by our racial background in professional settings. We found comfort in knowing these are

not isolated cases, and encouragement in recognizing these differences makes us uniquely valuable. I deeply appreciate the effort of all Colorado AAUW members in supporting my participation in NCCWSL 2023."



AAUW Colorado Springs Girl's STEM Day Returns Tuesday, October 17, 2023...And there's a role for you! Coming off the exciting Girl's STEM Day we premiered in November 2022, AAUW Colorado Springs is planning Girl's STEM Day, 2023, with 2x the number of school districts, 2x the number of students, and 2x the number of volunteers needed to plan and execute a successful

Are you a member of AAUW?

Then there's a part for you. Whether you volunteer to stuff student bags, register students, serve lunch, source t-shirts, set up student stations for experiments, or any one or more of a myriad of other tasks, it's your participation that will make a real difference. And should you be out of the country from now through October, you can support the STEM effort through a donation to the AAUW Colorado Springs STEM fund. What an exciting opportunity to influence the next generation of girls and women! Girl's STEM Day will focus on 7th grade girls, in Districts 2,3,8

and 11, some of the most diverse school districts in Colorado Springs, with some of the higher percentages of free and reduced school lunch.

Why STEM?

In Colorado, a full 10% of local jobs available are STEM jobs. In fact, there are 2 ½ entry level STEM jobs available for every new four-year college STEM graduate in this state. These jobs are some of the higher paying jobs available to college graduates. And yet, only 26% of STEM positions in Colorado are held by women.

Why 7th grade girls?

Societal messages start early that girls do not belong in these fields...particularly girls of color. By the time they reach middle school and begin to enroll in specific classes, girls are already beginning to avoid the traditional science, math and technology courses that are foundational to an eventual career in STEM. By sharing with young middle school girls the joys of STEM and helping them envision a fun and rewarding career in a STEM field, we'll inspire more girls to explore the possibilities, and begin to sign up for those basic STEM classes that represent a critical gateway to opportunity.

Why AAUW?

What organization is better positioned to lead in STEM than AAUW with its focus on advancing equity for women and girls through education, research and advocacy? In 2023, girls outnumber boys on college campuses nationwide, but there's still significant gaps in earning potential.

Why You?

Girl's STEM Day gives each of us the opportunity to live out our mission and put our values into action. A STEM career is not for every girl, but equal opportunity to explore and pursue STEM is

Women Student Leaders

As reported previously, Ana V, a Colorado Springs AAUW scholarship awardee and branch student member, attended AAUW's NCCWSL Conference held at the University of Maryland this past May. Ana received one of two state scholarships available to Colorado student members to attend this prestigious conference. Here's what Ana shared about her experience at NCCWSL:

"Attending NCCWSL this year was an amazing experience. I was able to participate virtually last year but being able to do it in person added a new layer of sorority and encouragement. All the sessions I participated in provided me with a new opportunity to look at my own leadership and analyze the different paths I can take to enact it. One of my biggest takeaways came from the first session named Power, Influence, and Impact: Women and Transformative Leadership by Grace Virtue. She talked about the importance of self-awareness and positive deviance as tools to promote our authentic leadership as women in a professional environment where we face constant barriers due to gender bias. Most of the participants in this session shared similar experiences of being targeted by our racial background in professional settings. We found comfort in knowing these are not isolated cases, and encouragement in recognizing these differences makes us uniquely valuable. I deeply appreciate the effort of all Colorado AAUW members in supporting my participation in NCCWSL 2023."
