

# **Co-Presidents' Message**

### CONGRATULATIONS!



At last summer's Board Retreat, we prioritized that we would "AIM for the Stars". The Colorado Springs Branch has been recognized by AAUW National as a 3-STAR Branch for our efforts to meet the goals of the Association in 2022-2023. Kudos to last year's Board for moving the Branch toward the mission. Only 9 Branches received 5 stars and 21 Branches received 4 stars. Roughly 50 Branches received 3 stars - so we are in good company - but also among the elite. Helping us to achieve these stars are our proactive programs in STEM, DEI, and Public Policy. We will continue to strive for our last two stars.

### HONOR YOU RIGHTS AND VOTE

The AAUW Board of Directors and Governance Committee recommend approval of the following bylaw amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW.

Any individual who supports AAUW's purpose of advancing equity for women and girls shall be eligible to receive admission to AAUW membership subject to completion of such informational procedures as the Board shall establish.

We recognize, that in today's world higher education degrees are one of several paths needed to advance equity for women and girls. Professional certifications, on the job training, career technical experience and life experience all are alternative paths to obtaining education and the skills needed to become leaders and advocates for ending discrimination against women.

The board recognizes that some members have strong views on the proposed change in the requirement for membership and encourages respectful debate on this important issue.

Also, it takes into account other polarized views, some of which prevail in our country at this time.

As branches are affiliates to the State and National Organizations, we adhere to the rights and responsibilities of civility which serve to govern our conduct at our meetings, as well as all AAUW member interactions.

AAUW Colorado Springs organized a panel on "Our LGBTQIA2+ Community: Facts, Challenges, Support" on February 17th. The Reverend Mallory Everhart of Vista Grande Community Church moderated the panel.

Liss Smith of Inside Out Youth Services talked about the connectedness that Inside Out fosters and said that being connected is the single best protective factor for young people in the LGBTQIA2+ community.

Dara Hoffman of Community Health Partnership talked about the importance of accessible healthcare for the LGBTQIA2+ community. She pointed out that 61% of those in El Paso County who seek gender affirming care are unable to access it at this time.

Stony Roberts of PRISM Community Collective discussed access to mental health care via PRISM.







# Pikes Peak Regional Science Fair - 2024

The AAUW Colorado Springs Branch rewarded two female scientists for their efforts at the 2024 Pikes Peak Regional Science and Engineering Fair. The Fair is slowly rebounding from the pandemic and there were twice as many participants as last year at this event at UCCS on Sat. Feb 24th. Sustainable energy was certainly a hot topic again this year -covering solar, wind, water, and biomass. AAUW recognized participants at both the senior high and middle school levels. Award winners were seventh-grader, Cameron Kempisty, from Eagleview Middle School and Palmer High

School sophomore, Natalie Muro. The winners each received a \$100 Amazon gift card.

Miss Kempisty's experiment, entitled "To Grow or Not to Grow: Testing Biomass-based Materials for a Greener World", investigated the effects of several different types of biomass (such as ground pistachio shells) products in soil on the growth of plants. She compared the plant growth between these biomass products and conventional fertilizer. Her hypothesis was correct that plants in soil with PAF + BioChar additive were able to germinate faster and also required less water to remain healthy. These products can help farmers have higher yields while being environmentally-friendly.

In "Effects of Mooring Systems on Submerged Point Absorber Wave Energy Converters", Miss Muro expanded on last year's project by testing if there is a correlation between mooring configurations and the amount of consistent electricity a submerged wave energy converter can produce. She designed and built her own mooring and produced energy that lit a Lego lighthouse. The data collection did not support her original hypothesis as it was shown that only one mooring yielded 206% more energy than was produced by the other more restrictive designs. Energy production from submerged devices is a real world application that is sustainable, efficient and does not impact ocean views.

The Science Fair remains a crucial outlet for young ladies to demonstrate their science capabilities and garner confidence and recognition. The pictures above illustrate the amount of work these ladies put into the projects. We also learned about iron deficiency in female athletes, trapping bark beetles to save forests, training fish to play ball, and how quasars **may** create "dark stars" - to name a few.
