




Introducing the 2024-2025 AAUW Colorado Springs Scholars

Springs Branch for your support of our scholarship program through donations and participation in the annual Authors' Day.




ALINEYLI by Brenda Wolf

Alineyli is extremely grateful to be receiving an AAUW scholarship to help realize her educational goals. Due to the untimely death of her father and challenging family issues, she has overcome many hurdles and feels that her greatest accomplishment to date is that she refuses to give up on her dreams. As one of her references stated, "She has set forth on a journey within a system that often prevents immigrants from thriving and succeeding;" but she is determined to persevere.

She is transferring from PPSC to UCCS this Fall to further her pursuit of a bachelor's degree in psychology. Ali is excited to seek this degree to achieve her ultimate goal of becoming a licensed mental health professional and work for a non-profit that serves marginalized communities. She hopes to continue her post-grad work at CU Denver which offers a more diverse faculty. She feels there is still a stigma in the brown community about mental health and she wants to help people deal with vulnerable emotions and set them on a path for a lifetime of healthy relationships.

Outside the classroom, Ali has been actively involved as a volunteer with the Accompaniment and Sanctuary Coalition of Co Springs (ASC COS) and the Colorado Immigrant Rights Coalition (CIRC), both are organizations that work to support and protect immigrants in the state. She has shown remarkable initiative by finding time every few months to volunteer as a dispatcher for the ASC COS community hotline. The AAUW COS branch wishes her success in her academic future.



AMBER by Jeanne Koss

Amber is truly focused on her professional journey in the field of nursing and proud of how she is balancing the priorities in her life. After working as an EMT in Aurora, she decided to become certified as a CNA (Certified Nursing Assistant), and she is now the sole source of income for her family since her husband decided to leave his job and stay home with their three children (ages 9, 7, and 2), realizing how much he'd missed with their two oldest. Amber's typical schedule includes attending classes at PPSC during days, working as a CNA nights, home at 6:00 AM for 6 hours of sleep, and 2 hours with her children. She feels her biggest obstacle is "Mom guilt," but realizes marriage is a partnership and that this schedule will not be forever.

Amber's accomplishments include a 100% completion rate for her courses, maintaining a 3.58 GPA at PPSC, and being invited to join 2 honor societies. She is determined to complete her ADN (Associate Degree in Nursing) in three more semesters and then

continue on to get her BSN (Bachelor of Science in Nursing). Her future may include either pediatrics or geriatrics. Amber is so very grateful to receive the AAUW scholarship......" a real help when a family is living paycheck to paycheck!"




Audrey by Jeanne Koss

Audrey is not a typical AAUW scholarship recipient who is majoring in education or nursing. She struggled in school as a teenager and had some challenges to overcome. High school was difficult and when she began her studies at Pikes Peak Community College the first time she majored in zoology. She found herself overwhelmed and unprepared for community college and

dropped out. Several years later she attempted community college again and during that time period her father died from liver failure. Dealing with her father's death and the grief that followed left her overwhelmed and unable to continue her studies again. She was also a single mother and had an eight-year-old child to support. Audrey's child had experienced severe emotional trauma and had an IEP for behavioral support. There were many times when Audrey was called to her child's school for meetings. Audrey and her daughter have both been diagnosed with ADHD and are receiving the help and support they need to be successful.

Audrey's stepdad asked her to fill in at his machine shop for an employee who abruptly quit the job. She stepped in and learned the job, discovering along the way that she had an aptitude for this work. She once again applied to Pikes Peak State College to begin a degree in Advanced Manufacturing, Machining Technology and CAD Mechanical. PPSC wasn't sure that she was college material and denied her financial aid. Audrey had to present a qualitative appeal in order to receive financial aid. Currently her grade point average is 3.85, she has three majors and will graduate in 2026 after three years of college all while raising her child, attending school full time and working in the machine shop! Quite an accomplishment for someone facing all the obstacles she has in life. I would explain what her job will look like after she graduates if I understood the dynamics! I think of Audrey as a Rosie the Riveter on steroids, and I know that women are seldom seen in these jobs. We are proud to be a part of Audrey's academic journey and know that she will be incredibly successful!




BRITTANY By Debi Levin-Stankevich

Brittany is a non-traditional student who has completed all of her prerequisites allowing her to apply to the Nursing Program at Pikes Peak State College in the spring of 2024. She has wanted to be a nurse since her days in middle school. Her goals besides being accepted into the nursing program are to achieve her Associates General Studies degree and eventually receive her BA degree in Nursing. Once she graduates as a Registered Nurse, she plans to work in a hospital setting in Colorado.

This journey has been long and strenuous as Brittany is also a single parent with a nine-year-old son. She states that as a single parent she has strived to strike the right balance between caring

for her son and working toward her dreams. After several years of living independently, working full-time and attending school only part-time she made the difficult decision to focus on her education. This has required her to apply for financial aid, and a variety of scholarships. She is now working only part time and attending college full-time.

She has been able to earn high grades and has an overall 3.9 GPA. She also teaches fitness classes, mentors middle school students for a non-profit organization called Educating Children of Color and tutors students at PPSC in Science and English. When asked what she is most proud of she without hesitation talks about her growth as a mother. One of her recommendations noted that she is a top student with much determination, a great attitude, and is dedicated to earning high grades and succeeding. The other recommendation noted that she will be great asset to her patients and any community she serves.




EMALEIGH by Mo Sigler

Emaleigh's close relationship with her grandmother pushes her to be successful and fulfilled even though her grandmother passed away two years ago. When her grandmother was diagnosed with both Alzheimer's and Lou Gehrig's disease (ALS), Emaleigh experienced the good and bad sides of healthcare, lessons she will take with her as she earns degrees in nursing.

In order to attain a bachelor's degree in nursing, Emaleigh accepted a track scholarship to UCCS. She learned that the scholarship was for both indoor and outdoor track which gave her only two free weeks out of the academic year. Before long, it was apparent to her that the year-long track commitment interfered with her pursuit of a nursing degree. Emaleigh gave up her track scholarship and transferred to PPSC where she is pursuing the associate and bachelor's degrees in nursing.

She currently works at Children's Hospital as a clinical assistant in the NICU. It is here that Emaleigh has found her passion for NICU nursing. Once she graduates with her BSN, she plans to work as a bedside nurse for a while, then sees herself attending graduate school to become a Neonatal Nurse Practitioner. Like many of our AAUW scholarship recipients, Emaleigh is highly successful academically. She maintains a 4.0 GPA.



GENESIS by Mo Sigler

Genesis and her family immigrated to the United States when she was four and settled in Colorado Springs. Throughout high school, she dreamed of becoming a nurse. A few months before Genesis's high school graduation, she met with a high school counselor. She learned that her DACA status (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) allowed her to work, however, prevented her from being legally licensed as a nurse. Although she was broken hearted,

Genesis knew that she wanted to work in the medical field, so she attended Pikes Peak Community College to earn an associate's degree in medical assisting. An internship at an OB/GYN office evolved into full time employment. The doctor she worked under mentored her, taught her new skills, explained what he was doing, and allowed her to watch procedures he was performing.

Her love for women's health and the medical field grew. At some point she learned that a change occurred, and that Colorado was one of very few states that allows people with DACA status to be licensed as nurses. Genesis returned to Pikes Pike State College, was accepted into the nursing school, and enrolled in a dual program for associates and bachelor's in nursing degrees. Genesis also received her CNA certification and works at Memorial Hospital North while enrolled in college.

Once she graduates, she hopes to be employed at a Colorado Springs hospital where nurses in women's health are cross training in Labor and Delivery, Mom and Baby, and Nursery. Her goal is to fight for patients when they feel they have no fight left in them.

Genesis is especially resourceful in applying for scholarships. Without regard for the amount of a scholarship, she applies for all that she can find. One year, she had enough scholarships that she only needed to pay \$43 out-of-her pocket! All of Genesis's experiences thus far have confirmed that she has chosen a field that she truly loves.

Sheer (SHE/THEY) is the Margaret Baptist Memorial Scholarship recipient 2024-2025. She enrolled in dual degrees at PPSC. Sheer will receive her associate degree in Medical Assistance along with a general studies associate degree. She will continue her studies at Northern Arizona University in pursuit of a bachelor's degree in medical assistance.

Sheer is non-binary and with one of her children being transgender, the field of medicine serving gender diversity is her career objective. Sheer, originally from Georgia, a widowed Mom of four children and a grandmother moved to Colorado to receive better health care for her child diagnosed with autism, prosopagnosia and other co-morbidities.

Sheer has had a variety of volunteer roles including serving with the Girls Scouts for 13 years. More recently she has served the LGBTQIA+ community including bringing back PPSC'S LBTGTQIA+ club, Queer Empowerment. Along with her scholastic achievements and leadership in volunteer organizations,

Sheer is also a skilled glassblower. Her vacations must include a place that offers a studio to blow glass.

November Branch Meeting -- STEM DAY

Volunteer Sign-ups, Funding, Progress

STEM DAY is fast approaching. The STEM Committee will have a table at the Welcome Coffee with signup sheets available for volunteers to help with registration, lunch, experiments, cleanup, and filling tote bags a week or two ahead of time. Anyone interested in serving on the STEM Committee may also sign up for that at the table. Thank you to all the members who took the time to complete our Volunteer Survey. More information will be coming out to them in early October. So far, we have 4 of 6 leads for the experiments. Colorado Springs Utilities has come up with three and one will be returning from last year.

If you choose to sign up as a Table Monitor who will be interacting with the girls while they are doing the experiments, please plan to attend training ahead of time. There are two choices: Monday October 28 at Colorado Technical College on Garden of the Gods. Chemistry is scheduled from 10:30 to 11:30, and Electrical Circuits is scheduled for 12:30 to 1:30. The other choice is from 8:00 to 9:00 the day of the event, November 1, at Hillside Community Center. Catamount Institute is putting on the Windmill Generator program. They have indicated they would like four helpers, but the helpers don't need training.

Thanks to our president, **Crystal Stebbins**, our funding challenge is met. She has arranged for some of her business associates and her own business to handle all the food requirements for all 250 participants. We're also planning to stay within our budget by asking last year's volunteers to wear their T-shirts again if their T-shirt is still in good condition.
